## Thought for the week 28th Sunday of the Year 10th October, 2021

If you visit Jerusalem you will at some point enter the Old City through the ancient Damascus Gate. It may not be as narrow as the eye of a needle, but it definitely presents issues for anyone trying to enter the city along with all their trappings of wealth – a train of camels and some goats, or a Harley Davidson.

For security reasons the gate was once extremely narrow, and highly problematic for a rich man and his retinue to navigate. Even now it is organised to make life as difficult as possible for the ostentatious, or unwary. Immediately on entry you have to do a sharp left turn, and then, again, a sharp right before reaching the relative spaciousness of the vegetable and fruit market. It's like an ultra-tight chicane designed to either slow you right down or knock you off course. As in Jesus' time it is still much easier to navigate the Old City with little, or nothing, to slow you down, complicate your journey, or offer any hostages to fortune.

You have to feel sorry for the rich young man – so eager, well meaning, admirable; and so wounded when he realises he is being asked to do the one thing he doesn't feel he can; his face falling. Mine would too.

*'The word of God is something alive and active'* says Paul. These aren't just words on a page. They are life itself. What a wonderful encouragement. And yet how challenging. The gospel really does read like a double-edged sword. First cutting one way – cutting the rich young man down to size. Then another – we mustn't worry *'everything is possible for God,'* and whatever sacrifices and effort we are able to make will be repaid a hundred times over.

On balance it seems everything is weighted in favour of a generous response, and of travelling light, however daunting this may, at first, appear.
