#### Thought for the week 16th Sunday of the Year 18th July, 2021

#### "Show the light of your truth to those who go astray"

The quote from the entrance antiphon talks about forgiving others by helping them past the mistakes they have made, but what if we discuss forgiveness in a different sense?

Typically, forgiveness appears as moving past someone's wrongdoing where the issue is relatively easily reconciled, but seldom is there mention of more complicated problems that can't be fixed with an apology. This could range from political views or ways of living in which you may not agree with someone else; it is these scenarios which most often destroy relationships. Forgiveness here is a lot harder as they haven't done anything "wrong", they just have a varying opinion.

As much as we like to preach the importance of respecting other people's opinions, the reality is not that simple - as in most cases it is more than just an opinion, it gives greater insight into the person you thought you knew. Within the first seven seconds of meeting someone, we already create an impression of who they are. As you can imagine it is infinitely easier to assume you know someone inside and out after being around them for a long time, however this leaves us predisposed to make assumptions which conflict with reality.

I interpret the above quote to be asking us to be open. Not everything is about converting people to your beliefs, and what may look like "astray" or the wrong path to us might be the right path for someone else. The best way to see something from another person's perspective is to see them first; to love them for who they are, not what you want them to be.
