Thought for the week Christ the King 21st November, 2021

The Solemnity of our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

From this weekend's Gospel reading we can imagine Pilate's puzzlement when questioning Jesus. What kind of king allows himself to be taken prisoner, facing a cruel and ignominious death, with no army on its way to rescue him?

When Jesus says, "Mine is not a kingdom of this world.", we should ask ourselves what sort of kingdom are we striving to be a part of. Where do our priorities lie? Are we more caught up in the demands of this world and the expectations of our society? Or are our eyes firmly fixed on the Kingdom of Heaven where Jesus reigns as the true King?

Today's feast, also more commonly known as the Feast of Christ the King, was instituted less than 100 years ago (in 1925) and was a response to the rise in secularisation, atheism and communism. It honours Jesus Christ as Lord over all creation. The whole of creation, and the effects of the climate emergency which we now face, has been at the forefront of our minds and news bulletins in recent weeks. How should we respond?

So, as we come to the end of the liturgical year, there is much to think about on this feast day: Jesus as King of all creation, Jesus as the King reigning in our hearts with his commandments to love and bear witness to the truth and, most importantly, what are our responses to Him.
