Thought for the week 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time 24th January, 2021

In today's Gospel we hear the famous calling of the apostles with the words, 'Follow me.' This invitation is alive today as Jesus continues to call us, his disciples, to 'Follow me.'

Everyone has been called first and foremost into an intimate relationship with Jesus, to walk alongside him as the first disciples did on the beaches of Galilee. Peter, whose calling we hear today, would later write in 1 Peter 5:7

'Unload all your worries on to him, since he is looking after you.'

To be a disciple of Jesus is to listen to the words of Jesus, in scripture, through the teaching of the Church and in quiet contemplation and to speak to him in honest conversation during prayer.

As disciples of Christ, we are invited to live our life of mission, or vocation, through the work we are called to and the relationships we are in. For myself, I am discerning my possible call to the priesthood with the help of the Church in the seminary. At the heart of formation is the call to live as the authentic person God has called me to be. This poses a deep challenge because of my desire to be in control, my reliance on shows of outer self-image rather than acceptance of my true inner-self, and the significant impact that the world has had upon me.

Like the fishermen in Galilee mending their nets, the call to be his disciple often requires leaving something behind. For me in formation I am beginning to see the broken nets I have been trying to mend during my life rather than trusting in the Lord and letting them go. It's a deep challenge, but the challenge lies in trusting in God and letting go of my agenda. The Carmelite vice-rector of the seminary shared a one-word piece of advice to us all at the beginning of our formation and I pass on to you:

'SURRENDER.'
