Thought for the week
17th Sunday of the Year
25th July, 2021

“Now you must repent [...] so that your sins may be wiped out.”

The season of Easter continues with its message of reconciliation and hope, and that’s underscored in today’s Readings. But first, Peter is driving home his point very forcefully. In case his Israelite audience had tried to forget, he reminded them that THEY were the ones who handed Jesus over to be crucified, THEY were the ones who demanded the release of a convicted murderer, THEY were the ones who approved the death of the ‘Prince of Life’. Peter did not pull his punches. Although he did relent and, echoing the words of his dying Master, he conceded that Christ’s persecutors did not really know what they were doing. If we were being picky, we might remember that

Peter hadn’t exactly shone with loyalty when he denied three times that he even knew Christ. The crux of the matter was that – on hearing the wake-up crowing of the cockerel, Peter repented immediately: ‘*He went outside and wept bitterly.*’ (Lk 22:62). What Peter is doing in the first reading today is urging his listeners to repent likewise.

A wise confessor, when confronted with a penitent who was struggling to accept that his sins could be forgiven, said to the penitent, “*Remember what Our Lord said to Peter, ‘Do you love me?’*” (Jn 21:15) If the answer we give to that same question is, truthfully, “*Yes, Lord, I love you,*” then we are on the sure road to forgiveness.

Truly loving the Lord is striving to keep His Commandments. He knows of our frailty, just as He knew of the frailty of Peter and the apostles: “*The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak*” (Mt 26:41). It is our honest repentance, our firm purpose of amendment and, above all, our love of God which will be our saving grace when we stand before our Creator with Christ, triumphant over sin and death, as our Advocate.

“And he who loves me will be loved by my Father...” (Jn 14:21)
