Thought for the week 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time 27th February 2022

'Empty vessels make the most noise' immediately came to mind on reading through this week's message from the Book of Ecclesiasticus. Although very short, this reading appears to have a number of nuances. We are advised to hear one speak before making judgement. This made me think about the various situations in daily life where we find ourselves having to speak, and as a consequence, inadvertently reveal a bit of ourselves to others....

We are told there is only ever one chance to make a first impression, ideally this must be a good one. Keep quiet in a group mingling session and you risk being perceived as dull or boring..... talk too much in a similar setting and you might find people quickly leaving.

So how does one get to speak appropriately, whatever the setting? Some people seem to have a natural flair and do this with relative ease...Others have had to learn, through trial and error. Today's world is awash with courses and workshops galore, helping people learn how to speak confidently to a varied audience. The world of work certainly requires this as a key skill, starting with the interview process.

In the same way we invest in interview preparation, or recall details of a book read ages ago to contribute to a mingling session or perhaps learn a new language for travel, could we perhaps also apply these principles to our 'soul speech' development?

Could we invest time to teach, learn and store in our hearts and souls the language of love, compassion, patience and all the goodness that would eventually manifest itself whenever we speak?

I think this is a lifelong conscious decision and would probably take considerable effort, certainly in the initial stages. But I also think that this has to be part of equipping ourselves to do the Lord's work well, as we do our day jobs, study and go about our day to day life.... 'Continuous improvement' is a corporate mantra, why not adopt this to improve the store of goodness in us to enable us to speak and relate to others as we should?

We will slip up sometimes, but with any luck we will have a patient and compassionate audience to help us along, rather than judge on first impressions. If this is part of the Lord's work for us, then we should be encouraged by St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians to never give in, never admit defeat, keep on working at the Lord's work always, knowing that in the Lord, we cannot be labouring in vain.
