Mahatma Ghandi was present at the battle as a stretcher bearer and the experience led to his belief in non violence.

The site is now an oasis of tranquility in a pleasant expanse of grassland with a myriad of exotic birds at the foot of the mighty Drakensberg mountains. It is the perfect place to consider the futility of war and our need for reconciliation.

The coming down of the Holy Spirit at Jesus's baptism looked forward to the coming down of the Holy Spirit on us. It is a time to commit ourselves to going forward to the individual mission that the Lord has given each of us in our Baptism.
